OP 6.

We take full account of our commitments in the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, including the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), **ADD: [the ILO Decent Work Agenda]** and the Addis Ababa Action Agenda of the Third International Conference on Financing for Development, as well as the Paris Agreement on climate change, the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction 2015-2030, the Small Island Developing States Accelerated Modalities of Action (SAMOA) Pathway, the Istanbul Programme of Action for the Least Developed Countries for the Decade 2011-2020, and the Vienna Programme of Action for Landlocked Developing Countries for the Decade 2014-2024. We also take account of the Rio Declaration on Environment and Development, the World Summit on Sustainable Development, the World Summit for Social Development, the Programme of Action of the International Conference on Population and Development, the Beijing Platform for Action, and the United Nations Conference on Sustainable Development, and the follow up to these conferences.

OP 69.

We commit to support local provision of goods and **CHANGE: [basic essential public services]**, leveraging the proximity of resources, recognizing that a heavy reliance on distant sources of energy, water, food, and materials can pose sustainability challenges, including vulnerability to service supply disruptions, and that local provision can enable better access for inhabitants to resources.

OP 100.

We will promote compliance with legal requirements through strong inclusive management frameworks and accountable institutions that deal with land registration and governance, **ADD: [including labour standard clauses in public procurement contracts, and]** applying a transparent and sustainable management and use of land, property registration, and sound financial system. We will support local governments and relevant stakeholders, through a variety of mechanisms, in developing and using basic land inventory information, such as a cadaster, valuation and risk maps, as well as land and housing price records to generate the high-quality, timely, and reliable disaggregated data by income, sex, age, race, ethnicity, migration status, disability, geographic location, and other characteristics relevant in national context, needed to assess changes in land values, while ensuring that these data will not be used for discriminatory policies on land use.
